Kolbe Prison Ministries Conference: Sharing the love of Christ with those in prison

The theme for recent Kolbe Prison Ministries conference was, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few," and more than 300 attendees heard heartfelt talks from Archbishop Gustavo García-Siller, MSpS, Auxiliary Bishop Michael Boulette, Father Clay Hunt, Father Mitch Pacwa, SJ, from EWTN, and from five ex-offenders whose lives have been impacted by Kolbe Prison Ministries. The gathering was held at St. Mark the Evangelist Church Event Center.

Kolbe Prison Ministries (KPM) is a Catholic organization founded in 2009 in Fredericksburg. KPM ministers to incarcerated men and women *in over 50 Texas* and Louisiana State prisons and jails.

Why minister to prisoners? There are many examples in the Bible of God's way of dealing with sinners ... of his mercy and forgiveness, of repentance and renewal, of reconciliation and resurrection. We have all made bad choices, fallen short, messed up, and lost our way. Some to a greater degree than others. Those who committed serious sins (crimes) and got caught ended up behind bars. These people are still children of God and remain rich in his love for them. These are the least of our brothers, and what we do for them, we do for Jesus. We know in our hearts that we are not the judge.

We've read in John's gospel that Jesus forgave the criminal who was being crucified right next to Him.


So, what are we called to do? Jesus tells us in Matthew 25 that we are to perform corporal works of mercy; one described as "I was in prison, and you visited me." Of all the various works of mercy that Jesus could have pointed out, He stated that visiting prisoners is especially important in God's eyes. And so KPM takes Jesus at his word and lives out this particular call. Simply because they are incarcerated doesn't mean that inmates should be deprived of caring fellowship and the Catholic sacraments. They should be able to receive the Eucharist, be given the opportunity to be forgiven of their sins through reconciliation, and be able to learn about our faith through Bible study and RCIA.

Archbishop Gustavo, the keynote speaker, has been a great supporter of Catholic ministry in the prisons, detention centers, and jails within the Archdiocese of San Antonio. The archbishop explained that Jesus is present in these facilities which is why those who are called get so much from their service. He said that we do this with love of Jesus Christ. Archbishop Gustavo, along with all of the speakers, make time to visit those in prison to share their love of Christ with those considered the least among us.

"Emboldened not by our own egos,



but rather, by the grace of the Holy Spirit, we who are unworthy of this call, unqualified for this call, but now qualified by God, go forth with courage and hope to encounter and accompany those little ones, those imprisoned and their families, to proclaim the love of God!" said the Missionary of the Holy Spirit at teh conference. "We cannot reach all 140,000 incarcerated today, or all
